# We need to work together on housing

There needs to be a constructive relationship between the various housing campaign groups and the Conservatives at Uttlesford in order for us to have any success in getting the right result for the community overall

The housing argument has descended into a row between various councillors and groups and as a result nothing is being achieved to actually get the housing numbers reduced and that's what we really need.

We need a body made up of district councillors, town and parish councillors, members of the campaign groups from the towns and villages around the district and our MP This should also be done in partnership with neighbouring districts who are all going through this same painful process. The sole objective of this group should be to lobby the relevant ministers to allow councils to both decide their own housing numbers/ need, and to be able to restart and review their local plans and without the threat of mass development going ahead as a result of the delay. The council has recently been criticised by local campaign groups and the Liberal Democrats (who already resigned from the housing debate some time ago at Uttlesford) for allocating the majority of the additional homes to a single site in Elsenham. This is something many of the same people had previously been in supportive of.

We need to stop arguing over the sites and the plan and start working together constructively to get the numbers reduced to levels we believe will be sustainable for Uttlesford. If these homes weren't allocated to single site in Elsenham, they will go to the bigger settlements such as Saffron Walden. Presently simply saying "no" to new housing is not an option for any of us.

# We need transparent representatives

As a parent and having previously taught in schools that supported significant numbers of families in need, I've become very interested in the debate on appropriate housing provision in the town. I am concerned those families in housing need will get lost in the political arguments for and against mass development as a whole. UDC has constantly referred to the number of 1,600 on the housing waiting lists in Uttlesford as a reason to green light more housing as a whole, when the truth is that there are half the number. The actual figure on the list is 754 families in band A-D, i.e. those who are not adequately housed, and of those, 638 have an Uttlesford connection. UDC hasn't provided the details of those specific settlements that are most in need, which is surely essential to make sure that we build the right houses in the right places! This all proves both the frailty and the futility of the Local Plan

## Not having a plan is Lib Dems' best policy

I note the recent suggestion of a local Liberal Democrat that I should intervene to make Uttlesford District Council think again about its housing proposals (*Reporter*, page 3 Noy 28).

It strikes me that the council has been thinking about this issue non-stop for the last eight years, first under Lib Dem control and more recently with Conservative leadership. Funny thing, but I don't remember the Lib Dems getting so far as having a finalised plan which we could all stand back and applaud for its sensitivity and far-sightedness.

Agreeing on a plan is, of course, when the trouble begins. As soon as people see their village or their town being allocated more houses than they feel they want they – quite understandably – resist. That is where the Lib Dems come in. The affected community will quickly discover that the Lib Dems are on their side.

Maybe the council after consultation has a change of heart and the finger then points in another direction. With a crunching of gears and a squeal of brakes the Lib Dem protest wagon will roll up to make common cause. Not having a plan is undoubtedly the Lib Dems' best policy. No-one



need be offended. They become everyone's sympathetic friend. Stick with condemning Plan A whatever Plan A happens to be. Don't be so foolish as to offer a Plan B, because that would actually mean having to say where 4,000, 6,000, 8,000 or 10,000 houses should be put. That might just prove controversial.

Perhaps I am being a bit unfair. In reality I have to admit that the Lib Dems do have an alternative plan. You see, it's the next plan, the one just round the corner, the one that 'thinking again' will produce. How blind we all are not to recognise it. After all it is just a matter of going back to the drawing board. Before long it will be staring you in the face. Strange though that the Lib Dems have given us no hint as to what shape, let alone content, it might have. One wonders how long they can hide. I tried in 2008 to help the council

by holding an informal meeting of parish and town councils. All bar two were represented. On a private and non-committed basis the largest number of voluntary bids for new housing reached around 2,100. This is way below estimated need for the next 20 years. No amount of thinking again can reduce the serious nature of the decision that the council has to take. In the meantime planning applications whether in conformity or conflict with the draft local plan will have to be processed. It really would help if the Lib Dems would tell young people who aspire to own or rent a home in the district where they may expect to find one. A spoonful of bi-partisanship might help lasting decisions to be made

### Education and traffic is a real concern

It does seem that the negative scenarios relating to Saffron Walden's future are rapidly in danger of becoming reality. I am referring to two issues in particular: education and traffic. Next week an application will be presented before the planning committee for 300 homes to the east of Walden. This site has zero employment benefits and whilst it promises to bring additional leisure facilities to the town, will provide zero additional school places. Essex County Council did suggest the developer should provide a school but Uttlesford's officers said this wasn't fair on the developer and should be the responsibility of the developer of the "bigger adjacent" site. In addition the developer of this "bigger adjacent" site was also to be responsible for delivering the "essential mitigation measure" (the words of Kier's Transport Assessment) to cope with additional traffic caused by the Kier site. This site is no longer bigger than the Kier site but also no longer adjacent. So in one fail swoop the "required mitigation measure" of the link road to Kier has disappeared as has any hope of asking the other developer to deliver a new school.
